### Individual speculative pictures


The secret of inventing these is to clear your mind of any specific incident. The picture must be ambiguous! For ways of using these pictures, see page 122.

### Story sequences





reading




Usually a single picture is too ambiguous to teach the meaning of a new item. It might be enough to teach 'tree' with a single picture.




He is going to drink his tea. He is drinking his tea.

### Comparing pictures






Fine companisons rather than broad contrasts are essential for some concepts.

### Sequence pictures




The idea of 'running back' is only understandable if one knows where he has come from.
